Hurley Medical Center is well along on its project to install the nation's premier hospital clinical information system, Epic. This fully integrated electronic medical record will be installed in all aspects of Hurley's clinical functions by the end of 2011.

Connect to Epic from Anywhere

Physicians on the Hurley staff will be able to access detailed patient information not only within the medical center but also from their offices or

homes - anywhere with an Internet connection. With Epic, physicians and their office staffs will have a *single* point of access with a single log-in to all aspects of care for patients at Hurley.

Epic allows you to:

- Review patient charts
- Sign orders or patient notes
- Review consults
- Review labs
- Manage your inpatients from anywhere, including entering orders

- Schedule the OR
- Customize your individual "first screen" as you prefer to see it upon login
- See a complete Chart Synopsis on your patients, with time graphs that compile patient care, vital signs, medication dispensing, etc.
- Order laboratory and radiology tests from the office or within the hospital

For physicians who do not come to the medical center, Epic provides information on your patients while they're being cared for at Hurley. Patient status and event notifications (admit, discharge, ER, H&Ps, consults, discharge summaries, and discharge instructions) can all be sent to you via email.

Epic also directly connects you to other hospitals that have installed Epic. Whenever your patients obtain services at other Epic hospitals, their information will be immediately available to you through Hurley's Epic. Locally, Beaumont and Covenant hospitals have installed Epic, and University of Michigan is in the process.

Patient information from non-Epic hospitals will be

available through Michigan
Health Connect, a regional
health information interchange
endorsed by the Flint Area
Health Coalition. Currently,
both McLaren and Genesys
participate in providing patient
information through Michigan
Health Connect. Hurley will join
that system as well.

Choosing the Right Electronic Medical Record for Your Office

An electronic medical record for your office practice will soon become the standard for transacting with third party payers. At both the state and federal levels, there are significant incentives to physicians installing an office EMR and possible reimbursement reduction for those who do not.

Based on discussions with our physician community, we at Hurley thoroughly believe it is up to you to decide which EMR is best for your practice. Hurley's installation of Epic

does not necessarily mean Epic is the best solution for you. Important considerations include:

- As technology evolves very quickly, the future of EMRs is not known
- If an EMR is certified for "meaningful use"
- Vendor support for MHC connectivity
- The system's support for ePrescribing and Wellcentive
- A vendor's ability to support training

Hurley encourages physicians to select the EMR best suited to their offices. Hurley Medical Center will focus on interconnectivity and adaptability, working directly with physicians and EMR vendors to provide access to patient information for your Hurley patients from outside the hospital through Epic applications, as well as provide the linkages between your office and other hospitals through Michigan Health Connect.

By committing to Michigan Health Connect, Hurley will be positioned to make your patient information available to you regardless of which EMR you already have in place or choose to install. Hurley will work with all private practice EMR vendors, such as Allscripts, e-Medical Notes, GE Centricity and others, to assure connectivity to Epic through Michigan Health Connect. Additionally, Hurley will dedicate staff and technical resources for in-depth assistance and training in use of Epic from your home, office, or hand-held application.

Hurley Introduces BOOST - Transition of Care Program



Hurley Medical Center has partnered with Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan (BCBSM) and Professional Medical Corporation (PMC) to improve the transition of care and ultimately decrease hospital readmissions. Using the BOOST methodology and tools (Better Outcomes for Older adults through Safe Transitions), Hurley is improving the communication between the hospital, the primary care physician and the patient/caregiver. Medical Advantage Group (MAG) is administering the program.

A risk assessment is completed by nursing and case management staff as soon to the time of admission as possible. The risk assessment helps identify which patients are at risk for a readmission within 30 days of discharge. If the patients are deemed at risk, then patient specific interventions by nursing or case managers are initiated.

Because some physicians entrust other physicians to care for their patients while in the hospital, information is faxed to the patient's primary physician after discharge. The information generally contains the history and physical, consult reports, discharge instructions and medications and the discharge summary. The case management staff also makes follow-up physician appointments for the patients prior to discharge. The research shows if the patient sees his/her primary care physician within 7 days of discharge, the incidence of readmission is less.

Case managers make discharge phone calls to the patient or caregiver within 72 hours of discharge. The patients are asked about any questions they may have, medication compliance and diagnosis specific questions.

One of the biggest changes is patients are educated by nursing and case management staff, using the Teach Back Method. The Teach Back method allows the educator to assess the learners understanding of the subject. If there are gaps in the patient's understanding, other interventions are initiated to assist the patient and avoid any clinical complications.

This BOOST project, which started on January 17th, is in the pilot phase on 5C. Data is report monthly to BCBSM. The pilot will continue on 5C until the end of June at which time, after data analysis, a decision will be made whether to expand to other units in the medical center.

Hurley Pediatric Sleep Clinic News



Unusual Case of Two Cancers Published in Clinical Neurology and Neurosurgery

Glioblastoma multiforme in a patient with a small cell lung cancer: case report, appears in the January 2011 issue of Clinical Neurology and Neurosurgery.

The authors are Khadeejah U. Bari MD, and Hurley Physicians Rizwan Danish MD, Qazi Azher MD, and Syed Aftab Karim MD. Dr. Karim is from the Department of Surgery; Dr. Danish is from the Department of Hematology-Oncology; and Dr. Azher is from the Department of Pathology. Each also holds academic appointments from Michigan State University School of Medicine, East Lansing.

The paper discusses a patient who had two primary tumors: one in the lung and one in the brain. Typically, one might suspect that the lung was the primary cancer site, and the cancer had metastasized (spread), forming a second tumor in the brain - or vice-versa. Or it could have indicated cancer of the central nervous system.

However, in this case, each tumor represented a separate and distinct primary cancer. This was an important finding

because treatment for a primary brain tumor is different from treatment for a metastatic brain tumor. The patient underwent treatment and was doing well at time of publication.

The health specialist will instruct the technique of each exercise as well as record your specific adjustments to promote proper body positioning and range of motion.

As a physician, it is just as important to stay or get healthy for your patients as it is for your own family as well as yourself. Everyone needs time for themselves and this is where exercise can really weigh in.
