




Revered Hurley Physician Returns Home -Michael Boucree, MD, MPH, FACP, CPE, Appointed Vice President of Medical Affairs at Prestigious Louisiana Health System

Dr. Michael Boucree, Vice President, Outcomes Management and Chief Quality/Patient Safety Officer of Hurley Medical Center, leaves Flint after more than two decades, for a position in his native New Orleans. Dr. Boucree will become Vice President, Medical Affairs of Ochsner Medical Center – West Bank, a part of the Ochsner Health System.

"I am proud to have been a member of the Hurley staff. I hope that my legacy has fostered foundations for growth, creativity and excellence and what I have built will spur

Hurley Implements Patient-Directed Visitation

Hurley Medical Center has made some changes to the visitation policy that will help us move into a more complete model of patient and family-centered care. The new standard practice is entitled Patient-Directed Visitation and allows for a more flexible, patient and family friendly approach to visiting hours. Many units within the hospital have been operating with this concept for quite some time, so they will not notice much of a change. With a patient-directed visitation concept, each individual patient's preference, family situation, illness, condition, safety and security needs are considered and a plan for visitation is determined. This will require some conversation with the patient at the time of hospital admission to determine needs and set expectations. Patients will be asked to designate one to three individuals as "care partners," those persons that we can share information with, and who will be considered part of the team.

Visitor badges have been eliminated and there are no actual "visiting hours," but rather each patient will have the ability to decide, with their RN, what is best for their individual situation. To protect the privacy and comfort of all patients and allow for nursing care, there are still limits to the number of visitors that can be at the bedside at one time in semi-private rooms, and in critical care areas. The number of visitors at the bedside may also be limited for patients with certain illnesses or diagnoses, and those that have the need for a higher level of safety and security.



Children under 12 are allowed to visit if accompanied by a non-hospitalized adult, and if a patient's condition and illness do not prohibit the visit.

There will be designated "quiet hours" within the hospital from 9:00 pm to 7:00 am. Patients will be asked to notify their RN if they expect a visitor to arrive after 9:00 pm. Those who do arrive after the 9:00 pm hour will be greeted by public safety and a call will be made to the nursing unit to be sure the visitor is expected by the patient. The hallmark of this policy is flexibility and taking individual patient circumstances into consideration. A patient that is more comfortable with a loved one at their bedside will have that option. Flint Businessman is Hurley Foundation's 2011 Trauma Golf Ambassador


Joe Ketzler is the Hurley Foundation's guest of honor and ambassador at the 27th Trauma Center Golf Classic at Flint Golf Club on September 12, 2011.

Joe Ketzler doesn't take anything for granted anymore. On May 10, 2010, the Flint Township man's life changed forever, when his car was "t-boned" by another vehicle at the intersection of Jennings and Stanley Road in Mt. Morris. Joe was transported to Hurley's Level I Trauma Center - the only one in Genesee County. The 53-year old suffered a split femur lengthwise, broken pelvis in three places, broken collarbone, and a closed head injury.

Following discharge, Joe continued 10 months of intense rehabilitation, where he underwent physical and speech therapy. Says Joe, "I can't believe

how lucky I am to have survived this nearly fatal crash - I have my life back, and it's all because of Hurley. I am so grateful for the outstanding clinical care and compassion that I received in NeuroTrauma, Rehabilitation on 6East and by the amazing clinical staff. I would not be here without Hurley. I feel so blessed to have a second chance at life now," says Ketzler.

On Monday, September 12, 2011 the Hurley Foundation will hold its 27th Annual Trauma Center Golf Classic at the Flint Golf Club to benefit Hurley's Trauma Center and Burn Unit. Hurley Medical Center Kicks Off Nurses Improving Care for Healthsystem Elders (NICHE) Program 1st and Only Medical Facility to Offer Specialized Care in Genesee County

Hurley Medical Center is proud to be designated a NICHE hospital - the only national designation indicating a hospital's commitment to elder care excellence. Hurley is the only Genesee County hospital offering this specialized service for seniors, and is one of 19 hospitals in Michigan offering this unique program. NICHE helps hospitals like Hurley create an environment where geriatric patients (anyone 65 & older) are cared for in ways that bring about better outcomes while also meeting older patients' unique needs.

"The NICHE program helps hospitals like Hurley by implementing proven strategies and methods to address issues specific to older patients, improves patient outcomes and raises patient and family satisfaction levels. NICHE assists by giving nurses and other staff the knowledge and resources to help meet the specialized needs of hospitalized older adult patients and their families," says Angela Mitchell, BSN, MS, CNML, Nurse Administrator for Medical-Surgical Services at Hurley.

Launched at Hurley in 2008, the NICHE program has been steadily growing. Today, NICHE Geriatric Resource Nurses at Hurley visit

elder patients, assess their needs, and explain the NICHE program to them on 7East and 9East, daily. These nurses are available for consult on any inpatient unit, and meet with a multidisciplinary team to determine the best and most appropriate care plan for these patients.

NICHE evidence-based protocols focus on fall prevention, reduction in the use of restraints, pain management, appropriate use of medications, wound care, dementia care, and addressing patient and family concerns.

On May 24, 2011, representatives from Genesee County senior centers, agencies and local organizations toured Hurley's ER expansion project and attended a NICHE presentation in Charles White Conference Center at Hurley.

Epic Update: Delay in "Go Live" Date

The Hurley Medical Center conversion of our clinical information system to the fully integrated Epic system touches all aspects of patient care and activities of the medical center. Given the impact Epic will have on all Hurley Medical Center patient care and business activities, it is critical all aspects are in place for a flawless implementation on the go-live date, planned for October 29, 2011. Upon a 90-day readiness assessment, it was determined that some key elements of the system would not be in place for that critical, flawless implementation.

Therefore, Hurley Medical Center leadership has made a proactive business decision to delay our "go live" date until early 2012. In the next

few weeks, we will be evaluating the necessary steps to assure completion of the remaining work and determine a new Epic "go-live" date.

How will this change impact the Hurley Medical Staff?

Policy Revision

 The recent policies adopted by the Medical Executive Committee on Epic training for the medical staff and Computerized Practitioner Order Entry will be changed to revised the new "go live" date when determined & sent to you at a later date.

Local Practices Earn Patient-Centered Medical Home Designation from Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan Nation's Largest PCMH Program Transforming Primary Care in Flint

Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan (BCBSM) has designated 25 practices from Flint-area physician organization, Professional Medical Corporation (PMC), as a Patient-Centered Medical Homes for 2011 – 2012.

That means that PMC includes a select group of primary care physicians in Michigan who are improving health care quality by adopting the PCMH model of care.

"The patient-centered medical home is health care centered on the patient, which is consistent with many of PMC's physicians' current approaches and values" said PMC Board Member and BCBSM PGIP Committee Chair Farhan Khan, MD. "We take a comprehensive approach to patient care, helping our patients meet their health goals and keeping track of all their specialist visits, test results and prescriptions, among other things."

BCBSM has designated nearly 2,500 physicians - representing roughly 770 primary care practices - as PCMH practices. The program is the largest of its kind in the country and has the potential to affect millions of Michigan residents. PMC increased the number of Patient-Centered Medical Homes from 15 in 2010 to 25 in 2011.

With the PCMH model, primary care physicians (pediatricians, internists and family practice doctors) lead care teams that bring intensive focus to their patients' individual health goals and needs. The teams work with patients to keep them healthy and monitor their care on an ongoing basis.

"We coordinate our patients' health care using technologies such

as registries, which help to track our patients' health conditions and ensure that they receive the care they need. We offer our patients increased access to the care team, coordinate complementary care and help our patients learn to better manage conditions like asthma and diabetes," said Dr. Khan.

A recent analysis of Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan claims data suggests that PCMH-designated doctors are succeeding in more effectively managing patients' care to keep them healthy, prevent complications and help reduce emergency room visits, in addition to increasing care and focus on their patients.

Additionally, in preparation of the implementation of its Organized System of Care (OSC) program, PMC physicians have scored in the top 15th percentile of all physician organizations in Michigan in cost and trend.

OSC's are similar to Medicare's Accountable Care Organizations (ACO) and are a natural evolution of the work physicians have been doing to implement PCMH capabilities. BCBSM is just beginning to define and establish criteria for OSC's, and one of the essential components is a minimum of 20,000 attributed BCBSM members, which PMC has. Also, a majority of the primary care practices must be designated as PCMH's with an all patient registry and a pro-active process of care.

OSC's expand the model of PCMH to include hospitals and specialists working closely with a primary care team, put emphasis on value-based care and encourage changes in incentives and reimbursement to support the development and reward the results, of highly functioning health care systems.
