Hurley MRI Updates and Advantages

Hurley's MRI service has some new and exciting updates added recently. While we continue to serve the inpatients at Hurley, we also have many advantages available for outpatients.

- Patients may now watch their favorite DVD while having their exam done. We have Genesee County's only MRI safe DVD player installed. Patients may bring their own DVD or choose from our library. We find this especially helpful with adolescents and those patients who may be claustrophobic.
- Pediatric sedation is performed under supervision of an Anesthesiologist. Patients are sedated in the Magnet and are recovered in the MRI Suite. Parents are allowed to accompany their children to make the experience more comfortable for the family.
- Adult sedation is also available. Physicians simply need to write "sedation needed" on the order and the patient will be given the sedation which is ordered by the Radiologist and administered by a Registered Nurse, who will also monitor them. There is no need to have the patient fill a prescription and take

Reminder – Please Schedule Your Epic Training

By now you should have received a letter from Drs. Katneni and Roebuck regarding upcoming Epic training. If you have not already, please carefully review this important information as it has potential impact to your medical staff privileges. Briefly stated:

- Medical staff members must be trained and have received a certificate of completion by midnight March 4, 2012.
- If training is not completed by March 4, 2012, the professional staff member will be placed in the Temporary "Off Staff" (automatic suspension) category, which means professional staff will not be able to provide clinical care, consultation, admit patients, access Epic, or give orders for care.
- Professional staff still not trained at the time of the board meeting, March 6, 2012, will be recommended for permanent suspension (not reportable to the NPDB). Privileges will be reinstated upon successful completion of training with the application fee waived.
- There will be no process for written orders after Epic implementation. All orders must be entered by the practitioner electronically. Limited exceptions are provided, including when the practitioner is not physically on site or where the practitioner is engaged (e.g. surgery or bedside procedure) and unable to electronically enter their own orders

Hurley Screens 200 Teens at FREE Teen Heart Screening Program on November 5th

On November 5, Hurley Medical Center offered a FREE Teen Health Check for area high school students, ages 13 through 19, at the School of Nursing. Over 200 students from throughout Mid-Michigan were screened. This special one of a kind program offered an in-depth heart screening that includes a medical history, blood pressure check and an EKG. Echocardiograms were provided, if needed. The screening looked for evidence of hypertrophic cardiomyopathy and other cardiac anomalies.

At the screening, Hurley clinical staff evaluated teenagers from the surrounding communities. Hurley physicians identified three "stop exercise" students, which indicates it would be dangerous for these children to continue exercise without further evaluation by a pediatric cardiologist. In addition, physicians identified eight "exercise but follow-up with your doctor" students. These children had abnormalities on their exam or history that doesn't preclude them from exercising, but does warrant further evaluation by their primary physician.

"The screening takes about 30 minutes," says Dr. Jim Weber, ER Physician on staff at Hurley. "Those 30 minutes may save a student's life or provide peace of mind for parents concerned

about their child's risk of sudden cardiac death and premature hypertension."

Sudden cardiac death is the leading cause of death in young athletes. Hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM) is the single most common cause of death among U.S. athletes. Nearly 4,000 of these deaths are among young people. And, 1 in 200,000 high school athletes will die suddenly, most without any prior symptoms. In addition, male athletes are ten times more likely to die suddenly as a result of HCM.

Internal Medicine Residency Program Earns Long Accreditation Cycle – 5 More Years

Current and future resident physicians in the Hurley Internal Medicine Residency Training Program can feel confident in their decision to train at Hurley. The program recently earned five years of accreditation – with zero citations – from the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME), a nonprofit organization that certifies the quality of a medical residency or fellowship program through its accreditation process. The ACGME evaluates and accredits medical residency training programs in the United States.

Nationwide, 44% of Internal Medicine residency training programs earn accreditation cycles of five years, the maximum cycle length, according to 2010 figures. The rating puts Hurley in the "high level of performance" category as indicated by the Residency Review Committee (RRC) action.

"Our residents get an excellent experience at Hurley," said Program Director Ghassan Bachuwa, MD, MS, MHSA. "That helps us to recruit highly qualified residents."

It takes a lot of work from a lot of people to provide an outstanding education, said Bachuwa. "What makes our program special is our hospital support of graduate medical education; our wide diversity of patients and pathology; our long-term experienced

and committed faculty – both full- and part-time, as well as community faculty members; and our educational resources, such as our medical library and our simulation lab activities – and our ancillary and community support."

Hurley Academic Officer and Designated Institutional Official James Buterakos said, "the five-year accreditation with no citations is a phenomenal accomplishment."

Chief Medical Officer Dr. Michael Jaggi said a combination of factors led to the strong accreditation results. "Without the collaboration, innovation and the commitment of our teaching faculty, community physicians and residents, implementing changes to make for such a successful review would have been extremely difficult," he said.

Hurley's three year Internal Medicine Program trains 30 residents at a time, 10 in each program year. In addition to producing competent physicians with excellent rates of board certification and fellowship acceptance, Hurley's Internal Medicine Program also offers a combination of strong academic and community health experiences, rare for a small community hospital, where residents also build close professional relationships and have formal and informal mentors. The program also has beefed up its research structure, with resident-faculty teams producing solid, published work. In addition, the program immerses its multicultural physicians into the culture of the community surrounding the hospital with resident teams visiting a few homeless shelters each week.

The Internal Medicine Program's next RRC site visit date is tentatively set for autumn 2016.
